

DAVE HOUSE

Dave House has a BSEE '65 from Michigan Tech and an MSEE '69 from Northeastern University. He began his career in 1965 designing data acquisition and computer communications systems at Raytheon's Computer and Communications Division. In 1968, he joined Honeywell's Computer Control Division where he led the development of a minicomputer. In 1972 Dave became Director of Computer Development at Microdata Corporation.

In 1974, House joined Intel Corp., and in 1978 became general manager of the company's Microcomputer Components Division. Over the next 13 years he led the organization that developed the company's leading microprocessor product line, including the 386, 486 and Pentium Processor line and grew that business from \$40M to \$4B per year. He also managed the team that developed the highly successful "Intel Inside" marketing program, the most successful ingredient brand ever developed. In 1994, Dave launched Intel's Server Products Division leading Intel's entry into the server business where it now has over 90% market share.

In 1996, after 22 years at Intel, House took the helm of Bay Networks as Chairman and CEO at a critical point following the merger between SynOptics Communications and Wellfleet Communications. Having effectively led the reshaping of the organization and rebuilding of the product line, he negotiated and led Bay Networks through its merger with Nortel and became President of Nortel Networks after the completion of the merger in 1998. House began a 15-month sabbatical in the fall of 1999. From 2001 to 2003, Dave was Chairman and CEO of Allegro Networks.

House joined the Board of Brocade Communications Systems in 2004 and was Chairman from 2005 – 2017, when it was sold to Broadcom. He is the founder and owner of House Family Vineyards and Managing Partner at The Mountain Winery in Saratoga. House is Board Chair at Silicon Valley Education Foundation, Vice Chair at the Computer History Museum, a Board Member at The Tech Initiative and Trustee at Northeastern

University. He is also involved with numerous community organizations through the House Family Foundation.

House enjoys driving his race cars and is the oldest driver to ever win an IMSA race. He is also an avid Heli-skier.
